GENERAL FUND

The General Fund ended May with a profit of \$1,454,579. The fund is performing well mainly due to strong revenue collections.

Total revenues ended May at 78% of budget which is above our target for this time. Current Property Tax Collections are at 98% of budget and have increased almost \$223,000 over last year. Sales tax revenues are at 76% of budget and have increased \$241,000 over last year. EMS transport revenues are tracking well at 78% of budget and have increased almost \$95,000 over last year. And finally, Transfers In from other funds are on track for this time at 63% of budget and have increased over \$174,000 compared to last year.

Expenses in total are tracking at 68% of budget which is on target for this time.

Overall, the General Fund is tracking very well with the budget.

GOLF COURSE

The Golf Course ended May with a profit of \$165,857 which is a fiscal year to date improvement of about \$315,000 over this time last year. However, it is important to note that the golf course was negatively impacted by the Coronavirus last year and was closed for the entire month of April. Compared to 2019, the bottom line has improved by almost \$204,000. The fund is performing well mainly due to increased Green Fee/Cart Rental revenues.

Green Fee Rounds for the year are up 50% and Green Fee/Cart Rental revenues per round have increased from \$25.20 to \$32.45. The increase in revenue per rounds is due to the March 2020 rate increase and fewer discounts on green fees.

Total expenses are tracking at 66% of budget which is on track with our target for this time.

Overall, the Golf Course is in great shape and on track to outperform their budget by the end of the year.

ELECTRIC FUND

The Electric fund ended May with a profit of \$197,289. Revenues are on track with the budget for this time of year and year to date consumption is tracking 3% higher than last year mainly due to the spike in consumption in February.

FY 2021

Compared to last year, expenses have increased, and our net profit is down mainly because the transfer to the General Fund for the return on investment (ROI) has increased. This was expected because the calculation for ROI was increased this year from .019 to .020 of billed consumption.

Compared to budget, the electric fund is tracking as expected for this time.

WATER/WASTEWATER

The Water/Wastewater fund ended May with a profit of \$393,685. Revenues are tracking very well with the budget for this time and consumption is up almost 13% compared to last year.

Water/Wastewater expenses are on track for this time at 63% of budget.

Overall, the fund is on track to end the year within budget.

AIRPORT

The Airport Fund ended May with a profit of \$112,679. Revenues are tracking ahead of budget at 83% because of increased fuel sales. Avgas gallons sold are up 22% and Jet gallons sold are up 102% from last year.

Airport expenses are tracking at 69% of budget which is slightly higher than the average for this time because of the expenses associated with the increasing fuel sales. However, that increase is being more than offset by the increase in revenues.

Overall, the airport fund is in great shape.

UNRESTRICTED CASH RESERVES

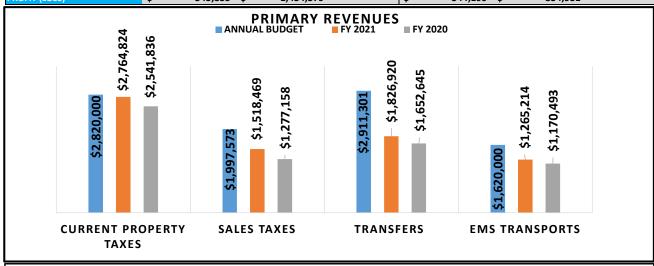
The total unrestricted cash balance for the City as of May 31st was \$7,828,659. That is \$3,794,659 above our 90-day required reserve amount. However, there is approximately \$1,438,000 remaining to be spent from those reserves on budgeted capital projects.

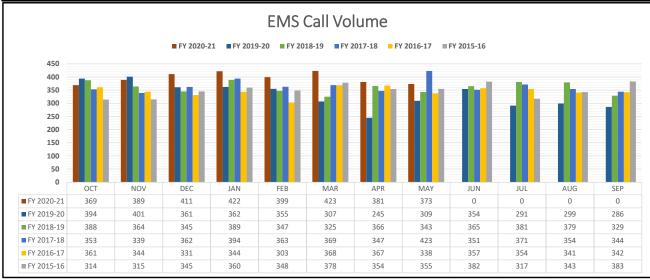
In addition to the unrestricted cash balance, the City has \$2,107,156 remaining in accounts restricted by council. Those accounts include the self-funded equipment reserve, capital equipment reserve, and the LCRA credit reserve.

A. Current Property Tax Collections are on track with our target budget for this period. The bulk of property taxes are collected between December and February.

- B. Sales tax collections have continued to outperform our targets. The increase is mainly due to on-line sales and the changes in sales tax compliance laws for remote sellers and marketplace facilitators that went into effect on October 1, 2019.
- C. Timing difference Most of the interdepartmental fees are collected on a quarterly basis which is the main reason why collections are tracking below the average run rate. We anticipate collecting the full amount as budgeted by the end of the year.
- D. Misc Fire Revenue includes the HHS Stimulus grant in the amount of \$88,525.70 for lost EMS revenues, the CATRAC grant for Fire in the amount of \$8,697, and the TDEMS grant in the amount of \$8,676 for labor reimbursements related to COVID 19.
- E. The SRO revenue is based on our current contract with BCISD. The total contract is for \$217,125 and we are to collect \$24,125 monthly for 9 months. As of May, we have only collected seven payments but are confident that we will collect the full contract amount before year end. The prior year revenue included a delinquent payment from 2018.
- F. Misc PD Revenue is tracking higher than expected because they received the NRA grant in November in the amount of \$4,377 and a grant for gas station skimmer surveillance in the amount of \$1,131.84.
- G. Franchise fee collection % should be tracking higher than the normal run rate for the period because the annual Atmos franchise fee in the amount of \$46,099 was received in February
- H. The City is not currently renting out it's facilities because of COVID19.
- I. Interest rates have dropped significantly more than we were anticipating during the budget process.
- J. Misc Rev is tracking higher than expected because we received insurance reimbursements for Fleet repairs and for replacement of the Covid 19 Tent that was destroyed by bad weather.
- K. Overall Personnel costs are on track with the budget for this time.
- L. Admin supplies are tracking above normal for this time mainly because of expenses for Teladoc and Ameriflex which were underbudgeted.
- M. PD Supplies are tracking higher than normal mainly because of expenses associated with the new Police Chief search.
- N. FD Supplies are tracking higher than normal due to ground ladder testing that was completed this year in February at a cost of \$4,487 and the purchase of EMS uniforms earlier
- O. Park supplies are up mainly due to purchase of temporary fencing for the baseball fields and increased cleaning supplies.
- P. Development Services supplies are tracking higher than expected due to increases in credit card service charges for the increase in online payments.
- Q. Admin R&M is tracking higher than the average due to the timing of the software maintenance payments. We anticipate the total will be within budget at the end of the year.
- R. PD R&M are tracking higher than expected due to timing differences. It includes mobile cad software payments and ammunition supplies which were purchased earlier in the year but are still within their budgeted amount for the year.

 S. Court R&M are tracking higher than expected because of increases in software expenses. Increases were mainly the result of the Court moving to a "paperless"
- system.
- T. Fire/EMS repairs and maintenance are tracking higher than expected mainly due to repairs for Quint 1, Fire Engine 1, Fire Engine 3, and ambulance repairs. U. Admin services are tracking slightly higher than average mainly due to the timing of payments. The majority of insurance, audit, and actuary fees have already been incurred for the year.

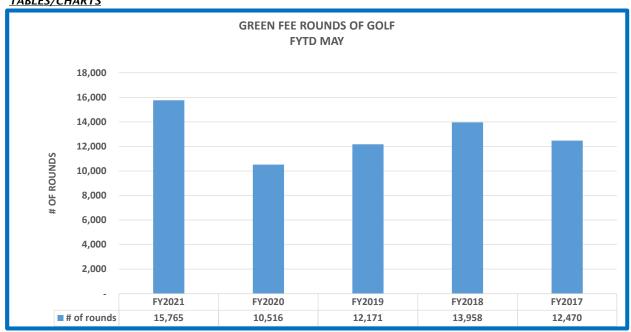

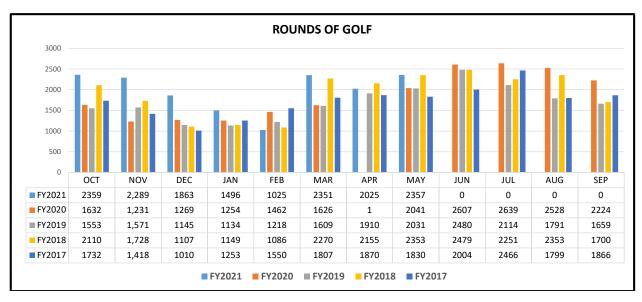

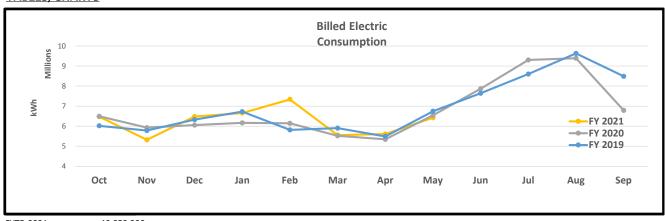

A. Penalties are tracking below budget because we did not assess penalties for January or February because of the impacts of the winter storm.

B. Electric Connect revenues are higher than expected mainly because of the Westfall Villages subdivision. Standard electric connect fees did increase from \$450 to

C. Pole Rental fees are invoiced annually in March. They have been fully collected.

D. Other revenue is tracking slightly below budget because we did not do disconnects during the Winter Storm and therefore no reconnect fees were charged. Last year other revenue was higher than normal because the department earned scrap/recycle revenue in December.

E. Interest rates have dropped significantly more than we were anticipating during the budget process.

F. "Use of Fund Balance" offsets "Transfers to the Capital Project Fund" \$7,353, and winter storm salary expense of \$32,712. Net effect to operations is \$0.

G. The target budget for Personnel costs through May is 70% (18/26 ppds plus 1% longevity). Tracking slightly higher than expected due to additional staffing and

overtime incurred during the winter storm but that is being offset by "use of fund balance" on the revenue side.

H. Community Outreach is at 73% of budget which is inline with our target for this period. It includes one-time lump payments to non-profits which are made in

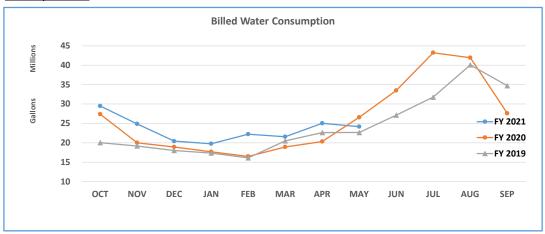
October and monthly utility payments for non-profits per interlocal agreements.

Background: The review and approval of subdivision plat applications are

governed by Texas Local Government Code Chapter 212 and City Code Chapter 98. Chapter 212 prescribes strict timelines for the planning and zoning commission and city council to take action on administratively complete plat applications. Additionally, chapter 212, in most cases does not impose any additional notice of the commission's or council's consideration and action on a plat application than is required under the Texas Open Meetings Act. City code chapter 98 imposes public hearing and notice of such public hearing not earlier than 30 days and not later than 15 days before consideration on a plat application. This notice requirement both causes unnecessary delay for the plat application; and, makes it difficult for the city to comply with the chapter 212 action deadlines.

Information: This ordinance would align the city's notice requirements for

consideration of subdivision plats by the commission and council with the state requirements found in chapter 212. It should be noted that unlike action on a zoning application, which is legislative in nature, action on a subdivision plat application is ministerial in nature, unless a variance is requested, and providing the additional public notice and providing for public hearings give the false impression that the commission and council have more discretion than state law

allows.

Fiscal Impact: This amendment will have a positive financial impact in that there will

no longer be an expense for publication of subdivision plat

application public notices.

Recommendation: Open the public hearing.

Background: As council is aware the subdivision of land into buildable commercial

and residential lots in many cases involves the dedication of street, water, sewer and electric infrastructure for public maintenance and use. To assure the infrastructure to be dedicated is designed correctly council adopted the city's construction manual. To assure the infrastructure is constructed in accordance to the approved designed, the public works department, in coordination with the city

engineer, make periodic onsite inspections of the work site.

Information: This ordinance would allow the city to recoup some of the costs

associated with the aforementioned onsite inspections. The proposed fee would be 3.0% of the estimated construction cost for the roads, water, sewer, and drainage facilities, according to calculations by the project engineer and verified by the city engineer.

The chart below was prepared by our city engineer and compares development fees charged by Austin, Buda, Georgetown, Hutto, Kyle, Leander, Marble Falls, Round Rock, and San Marcus. Burnet is the only city in the list not charging an infrastructure inspection fee

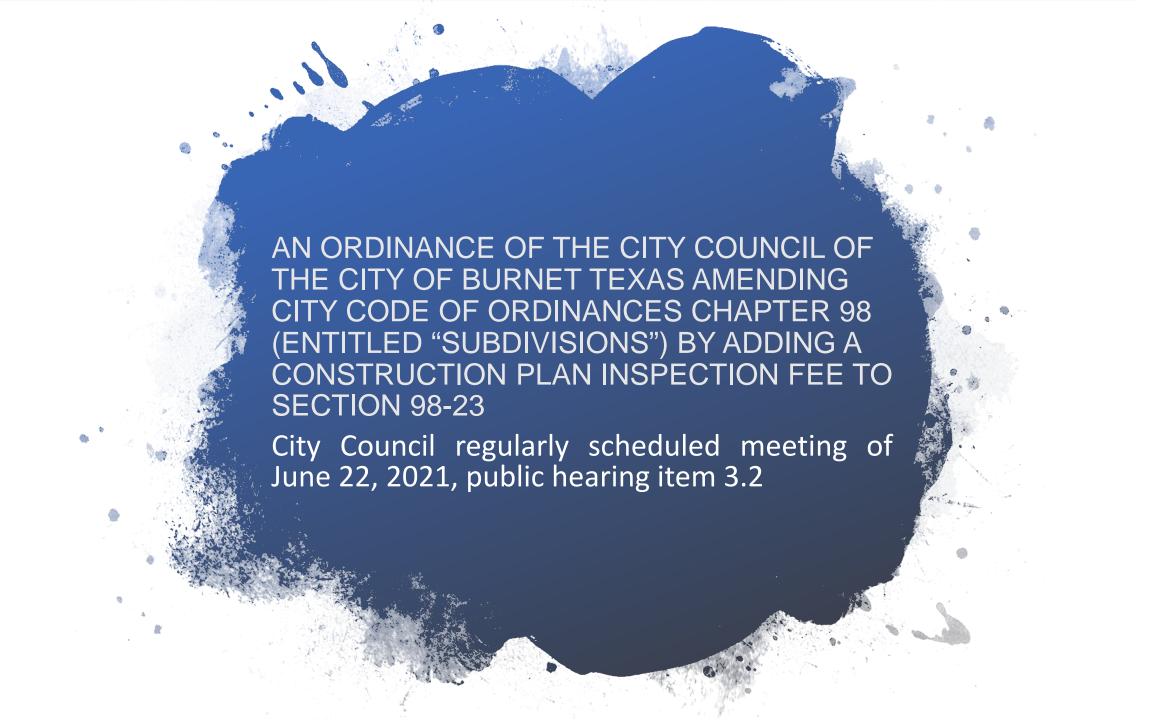

WHEREAS, the City Council, by the passage and approval of Ordinance No. 2021-001, affixed the zoning classifications for each and every property located within the city in accordance with the Official Zoning Map as approved with said ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Ordinance is to amend the Official Zoning Map by amending the zoning classification of the Real Property ("Property") described herein; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission, after conducting a public hearing on the matter, deliberated the merits of the proposed amendment of zoning classification and has made a report and recommendation to City Council; and

WHEREAS, in passing and approving this ordinance it is legislatively found the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council complied with all notice, hearing and meetings requirements set forth in Texas Local Government Chapter 211; Texas Government Code Chapter 551, the City Charter; and Chapter 118, of the Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, it is further legislatively found that this proposed zoning reclassification of property does not require an amendment to the Future Land Use Plan; and

WHEREAS, City Council, after considering the testimony and comments of the public, reports and recommendations of City Staff and the Planning and Zoning Commission, and the deliberation of its members, by passage and approval of this Ordinance hereby determines the action taken herein is meritorious and beneficial to the public health, safety, and welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS, THAT:

Section one. Findings. The foregoing recitals are hereby found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted and made a part hereof for all purposes as findings of fact.

Section two. Property. The Property that is the subject to this Zoning District Reclassification is 608 BUCHANAN DR (LEGAL DESCRIPTION: LOT NO. NINE-B (9-B), A SHORT FORM REPLAT OF LOT 9B, 9C, & 9D, BEING A REPLAT OF LOT 9A, HAMILTON CREEEK DR) as shown on **Exhibit "A"** hereto.

Section three Zoning District Reclassification. MEDIUM COMMERCIAL – DISTRICT "C-2" Zoning District Classification is hereby assigned to the Property described in section two.

Section four. Zoning Map Revision. The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to revise the Official Zoning Map to reflect the change in Zoning District Classification approved by this Ordinance.

Section five. Repealer. Other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent of such conflict.

Section six. Severability. This Ordinance is severable as provided in City Code Section 1-7 as same may be amended, recodified or otherwise revised.

Background: The shared polling locations provided by the joint election procedure with

Burnet County, enables "One Stop Voting" for the citizens of Burnet County, Burnet School District, and the City of Burnet. The simplicity of the "One Stop Voting" encourages citizen participation in the voting process.

Information: The County provides a once a year contract for each of the contracting

entities instead of individual contracts for each individual election. This streamlines the processes Burnet County uses with the individual entities that contract for election services. A copy of the drafted contract with Burnet County for the 2021/2022 Joint Agreement Contract and Election Services contract for all election services provided by the Burnet

County Election Administration from August 1, 201 to July 21, 2022.

Fiscal Impact Fees and charges assessed by the Burnet County Election Administration

office is based on participation of all local political subdivisions in the specified election. Average annual cost of election services is \$1,000.00 per

year.

Recommendation: Staff recommends approval of the Contract for Election Services with

Burnet County Elections Administration for the 2021/2022 Fiscal year.

JOINT ELECTION AGREEMENT 2021-2022

FOR BURNET COUNTY LOCAL POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS

Whereas, the undersigned local political subdivisions, collectively referred to hereafter as the "LPSs", each anticipate holding election(s) from August 2021 to July 2022; and

Whereas, each of the LPSs is located partially or entirely within Burnet County, Texas (the "County"); and

Whereas, the County has contracted or is contracting with each LPS to conduct and provide election services for such LPS's election(s) from August 2021 to July 2022; and

Whereas, the LPSs all desire to enter into a joint election agreement for the purpose of sharing election equipment, costs, services of election officials, and sharing precinct polling locations and election ballots where appropriate.

NOW THEREFORE, the LPSs agree as follows:

- **Scope of Joint Election Agreement.** The LPSs enter this Joint Election Agreement ("Agreement") for the conduct of the elections to be held from August 2021 through July 2022.
- **II. Appoint Election Officer.** The LPSs appoint the Burnet County Elections Administrator to serve as the Election Officer for each LPS in order to perform and supervise the duties and responsibilities of the Election Officer for any election from August 2021 through July 2022.
- III. Early Voting Polling Locations. The Early Voting locations for the elections will be at the AgriLife Auditorium, 607 N. Vandeveer St., Burnet, TX 78611 and the Courthouse South Annex in Marble Falls, 810 Steve Hawkins Pkwy., Marble Falls, TX 78654. The costs incurred in connection with the AgriLife Auditorium Early Voting location will be shared only by the Burnet Consolidated Independent School District, the City of Burnet, the City of Bertram, the Central Texas Groundwater Conservation District (CTGCD) and Burnet County. The costs incurred in connection with the Courthouse South Annex Early Voting location will be shared only by the Marble Falls Independent School District, the City of Marble Falls, the City of Granite Shoals, the City of Cottonwood Shores, the City of Meadowlakes, the City of Highland Haven, the City of Horseshoe Bay, the City of Double Horn, CTGCD and Burnet County.
- **IV. Election Day Polling Locations.** Election Day voting shall be held in common precincts where appropriate at the dates, times, and locations recommended by the Election Officer and authorized and ordered by the governing body of each LPS. Those will be decided within one week after the last day to order an election.
- V. **Cost Sharing**. The LPSs agree to the cost sharing provisions below. This includes Burnet County, the school districts of the county, the cities of the county, and the Central Texas Groundwater Conservation District. Other entities pay a lump sum of \$1,000 for their election.
- VI. Effective Date. This Agreement becomes effective upon execution by the participating LPSs.
- **VII. Amendments.** This Agreement may not be amended or modified except in writing and executed by each LPS.

COST SHARING – NOVEMBER UNIFORM ELECTION DATE

- The following expenses will be shared equally by all LPSs holding an election including Burnet County: the newspaper notice for the Logic and Accuracy Test of the ballots, consumable election supplies, and ballot programming.
- II. The user fees for the voting equipment, election worker payroll, and mileage payments to poll workers will follow these cost sharing arrangements:
 - a. The county will bear at least 70% of these election costs at each voting location. The remaining 30% will be shared so that 20% is paid by the Independent School District (ISD) or CTGCD associated with the polling place and the remaining 10% is paid by any/all cities equally sharing the costs. If both the ISD and CTGCD are holding elections, they each pay 10%, with any/all cities equally sharing the remaining 10%.
 - b. If there is no city election, the ISD or CTGCD associated with the polling place pays 20% or 10% each and the county the remaining 80%. Subsequently, if there is no ISD or CTGCD election, any/all cities pay 10% of the costs associated with the polling place and the county pays 90%.
 - c. If there is no city, no ISD and no CTGCD election, the county pays 100% of the costs.
- III. It is acknowledged that cost sharing expenses will fluctuate depending upon the number of required polling locations and poll workers required as General Elections, held on even-numbered years, typically require more resources than Constitutional Amendment elections, held on odd-numbered years.

COST SHARING – MAY UNIFORM ELECTION DATE

- I. The following expenses will be shared equally by all LPSs holding an election including Burnet County: the newspaper notice for the Logic and Accuracy Test of the ballots, consumable election supplies, and ballot programming.
- II. The user fees for the voting equipment, election worker payroll, and mileage payments to poll workers will follow these cost sharing arrangements:
 - a. <u>For polling locations conducting elections of the county:</u> the county will bear 50% of the election costs at each voting location. The remaining 50% will be shared so that 40% is paid by the Independent School District (ISD) associated with the polling place and the remaining 10% is paid by any/all cities equally sharing the costs.
 - b. If there is no city election, the ISD associated with the polling place pays 50%. Subsequently, if there is no ISD election, any/all cities pay 50% of the costs equally.
 - c. If there is no city or ISD election the county pays 100%.
 - d. <u>For polling locations NOT conducting elections of the county:</u> the ISD pays 80% and any/all cities pay 20% equally.
 - e. If there is no city election, the ISD pays 100%.
 - f. If there is no ISD election, any/all cities pay 100% equally.

CONTRACT FOR ELECTION SERVICES

THIS CONTRACT FOR ELECTION SERVICES (this "Contract") is made and entered into by and between the ELECTIONS ADMINISTRATOR OF BURNET COUNTY, TEXAS ("Contracting Officer") and the Local Political Subdivision set forth on the signature page of this Contract (the "LPS") pursuant to the authority under Section 31.092(a) of the Texas Election Code.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the LPS expects to order an election during the term of this Contract and during any renewal term of this Contract (the "Election");

WHEREAS, the LPS desires that certain election services for the Election be provided by the Contracting Officer pursuant to Chapter 31, Subchapter D of the Texas Election Code and;

WHEREAS, the Contracting Officer and the LPS desire to enter into a contract setting out the respective responsibilities of the parties;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties to this Contract agree as follows with respect to the coordination, supervision, and conduct of the Election.

I. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

- **A.** The purpose of this Contract is to maintain consistency and accessibility in voting practices, polling places, and election procedures to best assist the voters of the LPS. For purposes of this Contract the term "Election" will include any resulting recount or election contest. It will also apply to any election to resolve a tie.
- **B.** The Contracting Officer is hereby appointed to serve as the LPS's Election Officer and Early Voting Clerk to conduct the Election for those areas of the LPS located in Burnet County. As Election Officer and Early Voting Clerk, the Contracting Officer will coordinate, supervise and conduct all aspects of administering voting in connection with the Election in compliance with all applicable law except as otherwise provided in this Contract.
- **C.** The LPS agrees to commit the funds necessary to pay for election-related expenses for the LPS's election.
- D. The Contracting Officer has the right to enter into agreements with other entities at any time and may require that authorities of LPSs holding elections on the same day in all or part of the same territory to enter into a joint election agreement as authorized in Chapter 271 of the Texas Election Code. The LPS agrees to enter into a joint election agreement required by Burnet County.
- **II. RESPONSIBILITIES OF CONTRACTING OFFICER**. The Contracting Officer shall be responsible for performing the following services and furnishing the following materials and equipment in connection with the election:
 - **A.** *Nomination of Presiding Judges and Alternate Judges.* The Contracting Officer shall recruit and appoint Election Day presiding and alternate judges, central accumulation station

- judges, and the Early Voting Ballot Board (EVBB) presiding judge, all of which shall meet the eligibility requirements in Subchapter C of Chapter 32 of the Texas Election Code.
- **B. Notification to LPS.** The Contracting Officer shall provide the LPS with the most up-to-date list of presiding and alternate judges three weeks before the statutory deadline to order the election and again three weeks before Election Day. LPS acknowledges that the information provided may not be final or complete.

C. Notification to Presiding and Alternate Judges; Appointment of Clerks.

- 1. The Contracting Officer shall notify each presiding and alternate judge of his or her appointment. The notification will also include the assigned polling location, the date of the election training(s), the date and time of the election, the rate of compensation, the number of clerks the judge may appoint, the eligibility requirements for election workers, and the name of the presiding or alternate judge as appropriate.
- 2. The election judge will make the clerk appointments in consultation with the Contracting Officer. If a presiding judge or the alternate judge does not speak both English and Spanish, and the election precinct is one subject to Sections 272.002 and 272.009 of the Texas Election Code, the Contracting Officer shall ensure that a bilingual election clerk is appointed. The Contracting Officer shall notify the clerks of the same information that the judges receive under this section.
- **D.** *Election Training.* The Contracting Officer shall be responsible for conducting election training for the presiding judges, alternate judges, clerks, and Early Voting deputies in the operation and troubleshooting of the direct record electronic (DRE) voting system and the conduct of elections, including qualifying voters, issuing ballot style codes, maintaining order at the polling location, conducting provisional voting and counting votes.
- **E.** Logic and Accuracy Testing. In advance of Early Voting (including the sending out of any mail ballots), the Contracting Officer, the tabulation supervisor, and other members the Contracting Officer designates for the testing board shall conduct all logic and accuracy testing in accordance with the procedures set forth by the Texas Election Code and under guidelines provided by the Secretary of State's office. The Contracting Officer shall also be responsible for the publication of the required notice of such testing.
- **F.** *Election Supplies.* The Contracting Officer shall procure, prepare, and distribute to the presiding judges for use at the polling locations on Election Day (and to the Early Voting clerks during Early Voting) the following election supplies: election and early voting kits (including the appropriate envelopes, lists, forms, name tags, posters, and signage described in Chapters 51, 61, and 62, and Subchapter B of Chapter 66 of the Texas Election Code) seals, sample ballots, thermal paper rolls for use in the Judge's Booth Controllers (JBCs), batteries for use in the JBCs and eSlates, labels for the electronic poll books, and all consumable-type office supplies necessary to hold an election.
- **G. Registered Voter List.** The Contracting Officer shall provide lists of registered voters required by law for use on Election Day and for the Early Voting period.

- **H. Notice at Previous Polling Place.** The Contracting Officer shall post notices of a change in a polling place at the entrance to the previous polling location. Section 43.062 of the Texas Election Code provides that the notice shall state the location has changed and give the location of the new polling place.
- **Election Equipment.** The Contracting Officer shall prepare and distribute the Direct Record Electronic (DRE) voting system components from Hart InterCivic, Inc. ("Hart") for the election. This voting system includes the equipment referred to as "eSlates" and "Judge's Booth Controllers" (JBCs). Each polling location will have at least one voting machine that is accessible to disabled voters and provides a practical and effective means for voters with disabilities to cast a secret ballot.
- **J. Ballots.** The Contracting Officer or designee shall be responsible for the preparation, printing, programming and distribution of English and Spanish ballots and sample ballots, including the mail ballots, based on the information provided by the LPS, including names of the candidates, names of the offices sought, order of names on the ballot, propositions on the ballot, and the Spanish translation of the offices and any propositions. The ballot will be prepared in these formats: DRE, paper and auditory.
- **K.** *Early Voting.* In accordance with Sections 31.096 and 32.097(b) of the Texas Election Code, the Contracting Officer shall serve as Early Voting Clerk for the election.
 - 1. The Contracting Officer shall supervise and conduct early voting by mail and by personal appearance and shall secure personnel to serve as Early Voting Deputies.
 - 2. Early Voting by personal appearance for the election shall be conducted during the hours and time period and at the locations as determined by the Contracting Officer.
 - 3. The Contracting Officer shall receive mail ballot applications on behalf of the LPS. All applications for mail ballots shall be processed in accordance with Title 7 of the Texas Election Code by the Contracting Officer or deputies at the Elections Office, located at 106 W. Washington St., Burnet, TX. Applications for mail ballots erroneously sent to the LPS shall be faxed promptly to the Contracting Officer for timely processing then the original application shall be forwarded to the Contracting Officer for proper retention.
 - 4. Early voting ballots shall be secured and maintained at the Elections Office, located at 106 W. Washington St., Burnet, TX and in accordance with Chapter 87 of the Texas Election Code. The Early Voting Ballot Board shall meet at the same location unless posted differently.
- **L.** *Election Day Polling Locations.* The Election Day polling locations are determined by the Contracting Officer in consultation with the LPS and in accordance with the Texas Election Code. The Contracting Officer shall arrange for the use of all Election Day polling places and shall arrange for the setting up of the polling location including tables, chairs and voting booths.

M. Election Day Activities.

1. The Contracting Officer and staff shall be available from 6:00 am until the completion of vote counting on Election Day to render technical support and assistance to voters and

election workers.

- 2. The Contracting Officer and staff shall prepare and conduct Election Night intake of election equipment, supplies and records.
- 3. The Contracting Officer and designee shall serve as central counting station manager and tabulation supervisor, counting the votes in conjunction with the Early Voting Ballot Board and the Central Counting Station judges.
- **N.** Election Night Reports. The Contracting Officer shall prepare the unofficial and official tabulation of precinct results under Section 66.056(a) of the Texas Election Code. The unofficial tabulation of Early Voting precinct results and Election Day precinct results shall be made available to the LPS via e-mail as soon as they are prepared and may be released under law, but no earlier than 7:05 pm on Election Day. The tabulation reports may also be provided to other counties as necessary for the election.
- **O.** Provisional Votes/Determination of Mail Ballots Timely Received under Section 86.007(d) of the Texas Election Code. The Contracting Officer, serving as voter registrar, shall retain the provisional voting affidavits and shall provide factual information on each of the provisional voters' status. The Contracting Officer shall reconvene the EVBB after the election within the time set forth in Section 65.051 of the Texas Election Code for the purpose of determining the disposition of the provisional votes. At the same time, the EVBB will review mail ballots timely received under Section 86.007(d) of the Texas Election Code to determine whether such will be counted and to resolve any issues with such ballots.
- **P.** Canvass Material Preparation. Promptly after determination of the provisional votes and resolution of any mail ballots, the Contracting Officer shall work with the EVBB to tally the accepted provisional votes and resolved mail ballots, amend the unofficial tabulations, and submit new unofficial tabulations to the LPS. The reports will serve as the canvass materials for the LPS.
- Q. Custodian of Election Records. The election records will be submitted to the LPS except for those records that must be maintained by the Contracting Officer as Voter Registrar in accordance with Section 66.051 of the Texas Election Code. The Contracting Officer is hereby appointed the custodian of voted ballots (which in the case of the ballots cast on the DRE voting system consists of the DVD backup) and shall preserve them in accordance with Chapter 66 of the Texas Election Code and other applicable law. The Contracting Officer shall also maintain custody of the records pertaining to the operation of the JBCs and eSlates.

R. Recount.

- If required by law, the Contracting Officer shall perform a partial manual count of electronic voting system ballots in accordance with section 127.201 of the Texas Election Code. A recount may also be requested in accordance with Chapter 212 of the Texas Election Code.
- 2. The LPS shall advise the Contracting Officer if a recount is required by law or requested and the Contracting Officer and the LPS shall discuss how such recount is

to be conducted. The LPS shall reimburse the Contracting Officer for the cost of such count which is not included in the original invoice.

- **S. Schedule for Performance of Services.** The Contracting Officer shall perform all election services in accordance and compliance with the time requirements set out in the Texas Election Code.
- **T.** Contracting with Third Parties. In accordance with Section 31.098 of the Texas Election Code, the Contracting Officer is authorized to contract with third parties for election services and supplies. The cost of such third-party services and supplies will be paid by the Contracting Officer and reimbursed by the LPS.
- **U. Department of Justice Preclearance for General Elections.** If required by law, any changes to the general conduct of voting in Burnet County will be pre-cleared through the United States Department of Justice by the Contracting Officer with copies of the submission and response e-mailed to the LPS.
- **III. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE LPS.** The LPS shall perform the following responsibilities:
 - **A.** Applications for Mail Ballots. The LPS shall date stamp and then as promptly as possible fax to the Contracting Officer all applications for mail ballots that it receives. Promptly thereafter, the LPS shall deliver or send by mail the original mail ballot applications to the Contracting Officer.
 - **B.** *Election Orders, Election Notices, and Canvass.* The LPS shall be responsible for preparing, adopting, publishing, and posting all required election orders, resolutions, notices and other documents, including bilingual materials, evidencing action by the governing authority of the LPS necessary to the conduct of the election. The LPS shall be responsible for conducting the official canvass of the election.
 - **C.** *Map/ Annexations.* The LPS shall provide the Contracting Officer with an updated map and street index of its jurisdiction in an electronic or printed format and shall advise the Contracting Officer of any annexations or de-annexations.
 - **D. Department of Justice Preclearance for Special Elections.** If required by law, the LPS shall be individually responsible for obtaining appropriate preclearance from the United States Department of Justice for any special elections.
 - **E.** Ballot Information. The LPS shall prepare the text for the LPS's official ballot in English and Spanish and provide to the Contracting Officer as soon as possible at the end of the period for ordering the election or filing for candidacy. The ballot information shall include a list of propositions showing the order and the exact manner in which the candidates' names and the propositions are to appear on the ballot. The LPS shall promptly review for correctness the ballot when requested by the Contracting Officer to do so prior to finalization and shall approve by e-mail or by signature in person.
 - **F.** Precinct Reports to the Texas Secretary of State. Based on information provided by the Contracting Officer, the LPS shall prepare and file all required precinct reports with the Texas Secretary of State.

G. **Annual Voting Report.** The LPS shall be responsible for filing its annual voting system report to the Texas Secretary of State as required under Chapter 123 *et seq.* of the Texas Election Code.

IV. SPECIAL PROVISIONS RELATING TO ELECTION WORKERS

- **A. Number of Election Workers at Election Day Polling Locations.** It is agreed by the Contracting Officer and the LPS that there will be at least three election workers at each Election Day polling location: the presiding judge, an alternate judge, and at least one election clerk appointed by the presiding judge. The number of necessary clerks is derived from the number of elections at the poll and the number of registered voters for that poll.
- **B.** Compensation for Election Workers. The Contracting Officer shall compensate all election workers in accordance with the Contracting Officer's established compensation policies, in accordance with the Texas Election Code and using the rates set by Burnet County Commissioners Court for county elections. The Contracting Officer shall pay the workers and be reimbursed by the entities sharing the polling location unless a polling place is open for only one LPS holding an election. In this case, the LPS shall pay the election workers directly.

V. PAYMENT

- A. Charges and Distribution of Costs. In consideration of the joint election services provided by the Contracting Officer, the LPS will be charged a share of election costs and an administrative fee. The costs distribution is set forth in the Joint Election Agreement. A cost estimate shall be provided upon request only after all entities participating in the election are identified.
- **B.** Administrative Fee. The Contracting Officer shall charge a fee equal to 10% of the LPS's share of the cost of the election or a minimum of \$75.00.
- C. Equipment Rental Fee. Per Section 123.032(d) of the Texas Election Code, the Burnet County Commissioners Court has set the equipment rental fee at \$150 per JBC and per eSlate. There is no charge for Early Voting rental of equipment. If the County acquires additional equipment, different voting equipment, or upgrades existing equipment during the term of this Contract, the charge for the use of the equipment may be reset by the Burnet County Commissioners Court.
- D. Fixed Lump Sum Price for Districts other than Cities, School Districts and Central Texas Groundwater Conservation District. A LPS that is not a city, school district or the Central Texas Groundwater Conservation District shall pay the Contracting Officer a fixed lump sum price to administer its election. The only item not included in the lump sum price is the cost of any recount.
- **E.** *Payment.* The Contracting Officer's invoice shall be due and payable to the address set forth in the invoice within 30 days from the date of receipt by the LPS.

VI. TERM AND TERMINATION

- **A.** *Initial Term.* The initial term of this Contract shall commence upon the last party's execution hereof and shall continue thereafter in full force and effect for one year, subject to the termination rights set forth herein.
- **B.** *Renewal.* Subject to the termination rights set forth herein, this Contract shall automatically renew for a one-year term.
- **C.** *Termination.* If either party wishes to terminate this Contract for convenience or for cause the party must provide thirty (30) business days' written notice to the other party and allow for discussion of the desired outcome and options to reach the desired outcome. In the event of termination, it is understood and agreed that only the amounts due to the Contracting Officer for services provided and expenses incurred will be due and payable.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- **A. Nontransferable Functions.** In accordance with Section 31.096 of the Texas Election Code, nothing in this Contract shall authorize or permit a change in:
 - 1. The authority with whom or the place at which any document or record relating to the election is to be filed;
 - 2. The officers who conduct the official canvass of the election returns;
 - 3. The authority to serve as custodian of voted ballots or other election records; or
 - 4. Any other nontransferable function specified under Section 31.096 or other provisions of Texas law.
- **B.** Cancellation of Election. If the LPS cancels its election pursuant to Section 2.053 of the Texas Election Code, the Contracting Officer shall be entitled to receive an administrative fee of \$75. The Contracting Officer shall submit an invoice for the administrative fee as soon as reasonably possible after the cancellation, and the LPS shall make payment therefore in a manner similar to that set forth in **V. PAYMENT** above.
- **C.** Contract Copies to Treasurer and Auditor. In accordance with Section 31.099 of the Texas Election Code, the Contracting Officer agrees to file copies of this Contract with the County Treasurer and the County Auditor of Burnet County, Texas.
- **D. Election to Resolve a Tie.** In the event that an election is necessary to resolve a tie vote, the terms of this Contract shall extend to the second election, except:
 - 1. The LPS and the Contracting Officer will agree upon the date of the election and the early voting schedule subject to provisions of the Election Code and with regard to other elections conducted by the Contracting Officer.
 - 2. The LPS will be responsible for any Department of Justice preclearance submission under Section 5 of the Federal Voting Rights Act.

- 3. An attempt will be made to use election workers that worked in the first election; those poll workers will not have additional training provided by the Contracting Officer.
- 4. The cost of the election will be borne by the LPS; the Contracting Officer will work with the LPS on cost management.
- **E.** Amendment/ Modification. Except as otherwise provided, this Contract may not be amended, modified, or changed in any respect except in writing, duly executed by the parties hereto. Both the Contracting Officer and the LPS may propose necessary amendments or modifications to this Contract in writing in order to conduct the election smoothly and efficiently, except that any such proposals must be approved by the Contracting Officer and the governing body of the LPS or its authorized agent, respectively.
- **F. Severability.** If any provision of this Contract is found to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect the remaining provisions of this Contract and parties to this Contract shall perform their obligations under this Contract in accordance with the intent of the parties to this Contract as expressed in the terms and provisions.
- **G. Representatives.** For purposes of implementing this Contract and coordinating activities, the Contracting Officer and the LPS designate the following individuals for submission of information, documents and notice:

<u>Section 3</u>. The foregoing notwithstanding, no tax-exempt obligation will be issued pursuant to this Resolution more than three years after the date any expenditure which is to be reimbursed is paid.

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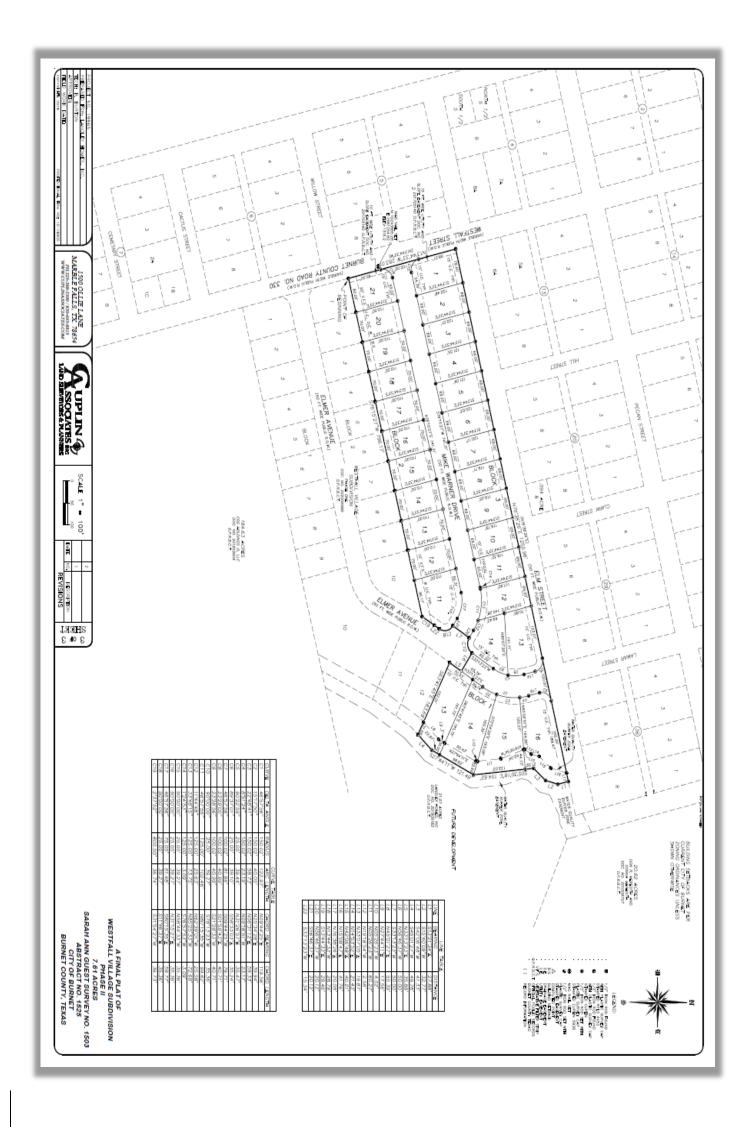

Background: With the unprecedented growth Burnet is experiencing it is

imperative that the city's development codes adequately address the street, drainage, utility requirements for new development. It is equally imperative that the city's development rules are drafted and implemented in a way that will meet the city's objective while causing

minimum impact on development costs.

Information: To assist city council in adopting development rules that both serve

Background: The review and approval of subdivision plat applications are governed

by Texas Local Government Code Chapter 212 and City Code Chapter 98. Chapter 212 prescribes strict timelines for the planning and zoning commission and city council to take action on administratively complete plat applications. Additionally, chapter 212, in most cases does not impose any additional notice of the commission's or council's consideration and action on a plat application than is required under the Texas Open Meetings Act. City code chapter 98 imposes public hearing and notice of such public hearing not earlier than 30 days and not later than 15 days before consideration on a plat application. This notice requirement both causes unnecessary delay for the plat application; and, makes it difficult for the city to comply with the chapter

212 action deadlines.

Information: This ordinance would align the city's notice requirements for

consideration of subdivision plats by the commission and council with the state requirements found in chapter 212. It should be noted that unlike action on a zoning application, which is legislative in nature, action on a subdivision plat application is ministerial in nature, unless a variance is requested, and providing the additional public notice and providing for public hearings give the false impression that the commission and council have more discretion than state law allows.

This amendment will have a positive financial impact in that there will no longer be an expense for publication of subdivision plat application **Fiscal Impact:**

public notices.

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-21

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET TEXAS AMENDING CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 98 (ENTITLED "SUBDIVISIONS") BY AMENDING THE NOTIFICATION AND HEARING PROCEDURES PRESCRIBED IN SECTION 98-22; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; PROVIDING CUMULATIVE, REPEALER AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Chapter 212, City Code Chapter 98 (entitled "Subdivisions") was adopted to regulate the subdivision of land within the city's corporate and extraterritorial jurisdiction to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, in Section 98-22 thereof city council has adopted procedures for the submission and disposition of preliminary plat applications; and

WHEREAS, in order to facilitate efficient and effective process of plat applications city council deems it appropriate amend the plat application and notification process to conform with state law requirements; and

WHEREAS, city council has conducted a public hearing allowing members of the public to provide testimony and comments on the proposed code amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS, THAT:

Section one. Findings. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Ordinance for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the Council.

Section two. Code Amendment. The Code of Ordinances, Chapter 98 (entitled "Subdivision") Section 98-22 (entitled "preliminary plats") subsection (f) (entitled "notification") is hereby amended by replacing the existing language with the language that follows:

- (f) Notification.
 - (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), immediately below, notice of the commission's consideration of a preliminary plat application or preliminary replat application shall comply with the Texas Open Meeting Act.
 - (2) Notification of commission consideration of an application to replat property zoned within the preceding five years as single family/duplex

residential shall comply with the public notice/hearing requirements of Texas Local Government Code Sec. 212.015.

Section three. Code Amendment. The Code of Ordinances, Chapter 98 (entitled "Subdivision") Section 98-22 (entitled "preliminary plats") subsection (g) (entitled "approval") is hereby amended by adding the language that is underlined (<u>underlined</u>) and deleting the language that is stricken (<u>stricken</u>) as follows:

- (g) Approval. The commission, after holding public hearings in accordance with city ordinances and codes, shall made a recommendation to the city council on the request for preliminary plat application. approval. The plat will be considered at the next regularly scheduled public hearing of the city council, but not earlier than five working days after the commission's hearing.
 - (1) The planning and zoning commission' shall act within 30 days of the preliminary plat filing date to either recommend approval, denial or modification to the application. Failure of the commission to act within the 30 days shall be deemed an approval of the plat, except as otherwise agreed to by the developer. Plans that are disapproved as submitted may be resubmitted without charge within 60 days of disapproval with additional fees being assessed. The city council shall act within 30 days of the approval or inaction of the application by the commission. A plat is considered approved by the city council unless it is disapproved within that period.
 - (2) Zoning of the tract, if applicable, that shall permit the uses proposed by the preliminary plat, or any zoning amendment necessary to permit the proposed uses shall have been adopted prior to or concurrently with the approval of the preliminary plat by the council.
 - (3) Approval of the preliminary plat shall not constitute approval of the final plat but shall constitute a vesting of the right to develop under city ordinances, codes, and policies in effect on the date the requested permit is filed, provided that neither the preliminary plat nor any subsequent plat or permit has been, or is, allowed to expire.
 - (4) The developer may elect to phase the subdivision project.
 - (5) The developer should be aware that specific approvals from other agencies may be required.
 - (6) Upon approval of the preliminary plat and all signatures having been executed, the developer shall furnish one Mylar reproducible copy of the approved plat to be kept on file at the city as public record.

Penalty. A violation of this ordinance is unlawful and subject to City Code of Ordinances Sec. 1-6 (entitled "general penalty").

Section four. Cumulative. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all provisions of all ordinances and codes, or parts thereof, except where the provisions of this Ordinance are in direct conflict with the provisions of such Ordinances, in which event the more restrictive provision shall apply.

Section five. **Repealer**. All ordinances and codes, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.

Section six. Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be

valid, and the City hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

Section seven. TOMA Compliance. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, as required by Texas Government Code Chapter 551.

Section eight. Publication. The publishers of the City Code are authorized to amend said Code to reflect the changes adopted herein and to correct typographical errors and to format and number paragraphs to conform to the existing Code.

Section nine. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective upon the date of final adoption hereof and publication as required by law.

Background: City council may establish and abolish appointed bodies, as may be

mandated by state statute or other law, or as city council deems beneficial or necessary to serve the public good. City council has established several boards and commissions to advise and assist in the governance of the city. Each of the active boards and commissions, except the planning and zoning commission, are established by ordinance codified in the city code. The planning and zoning commission is currently governed by bylaws. All boards and commissions are governed by an uncodified *Policies and Procedures for Advisory Boards and Commissions* adopted by city council in 2015.

Information: This ordinance codifies general advisory body rules related to the

establishment of such bodies and terms of appointment of a body's members. In addition, this ordinance codifies specific rules relating to the planning and zoning commission and reduces the number of

commissioners from seven to five.

Fiscal Impact: Passage of this ordinance will cause no fiscal impact.

Recommendation: Approve the first reading of ordinance no. 2021-22 as presented.

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-22

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS, ADDING TO CODE OF ORDINANCE CHAPTER 2 (ENTITLED "ADMINISTRATION"), A NEW ARTICLE III, (ENTITLED "ADVISORY BODIES"); AND ADDING A NEW SECTION 2-42 (ENTITLED "PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION"); PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; PROVIDING CUMULATIVE, REPEALER AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSES; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, city council is imbued with the authority to establish such appointed bodies as it may deem necessary for the conduct of city business and management of municipal affairs; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this ordinance is to codify the general provisions for the establishment and operations of bodies appointed by council; and

WHEREAS, a further purpose of this ordinance is to provide the public with easy reference to the advisory boards established by council; and

WHEREAS, an additional purpose of this ordinance is to codify the establishment and functions of the planning and zoning commission.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS:

Section one. Code amendment. City Code Chapter 2 (entitled "Administration"), is hereby amended by the adoption of a new Article III (entitled "Appointed bodies") to read as follows:

Article III. - Appointed bodies

Section 2-41 Generally.

- (a) Authority. Pursuant to the Charter and the laws of this state, City Council is vested with the authority to establish and abolish appointed bodies, as may be mandated by state statute or other law, or as City Council deems beneficial or necessary to serve the public good.
- (b) Purpose. The purpose of this Article is to provide guidance generally as to the establishment, appointment of members, and operations of appointed bodies. The authority, functions and responsibilities of such appointed bodies shall be prescribed by separate ordinance, resolution, or order of City Council.
- (c) Scope. This article is applicable to all bodies appointed by city council, whether such body is designated as a board, commission, agency, bureau, committee or by other designation.
- (d) Establishment. The authority, functions and responsibilities of such appointed bodies shall be established by city council ordinance, resolution, or order. In its sole prerogative, city council may abolish an appointed body; or modify or alter an appointed body's authority,

- functions, and responsibilities. In the event of a conflict between the ordinance, resolution, or order establishing an advisory body and this section the ordinance, resolution, or order establishing the advisory body shall prevail.
- (e) *Term.* Members shall be appointed for two-year terms. Members may be reappointed to an advisory body and may serve on two or more advisory bodies unless such appointments are prohibited by an incompatibility law.
- (f) Appointments. Appointments shall be made in June of each year. Each advisory board positions shall be assigned a place number. Even numbered places shall be appointed in even numbered years and odd numbered places shall be appointed in odd numbered years.
- (g) At will appointment. Except as provided by state statute, members appointed to an appointed body serve at the pleasure of city council and a member may be removed by city council with or without cause.
- (h) Policies and Procedures for Advisory Boards and Commissions. To the extent not in conflict with this article, qualifications, appointment, term, ethics requirement and meeting procedures shall comply with the Policies and Procedures for Advisory Boards and Commissions adopted by city council on August 4, 2015.
- Rules of order. Appointed bodies shall conduct business under rules of order adopted by the body and approved by city council.

Section 2-42. Planning and zoning commission.

- (a) Establishment. In accordance with Texas Local Government Code Chapter 212, Subchapter A there is hereby established a Planning Commission. In accordance with Texas Local Government Code Chapter 211, Subchapter A the members of the Planning Commission shall serve as the Zoning Commission.
- (b) Name. This body is designated as the City of Burnet Planning and Zoning Commission and may be referred to simply as the commission.
- (c) Duties and authority. The commission shall have those duties and authority prescribed in city code chapters 98 and 118.
- (d) *Membership*. The commission shall consist of five members. Three members shall constitute a quorum.
- (e) Officers. Commission officers shall be the chairperson, vice chairperson and secretary. All officers must be appointed members of the commission except the secretary who may be a member of city staff.
 - (1) The chairperson shall preside over all meetings, may appoint committees, and preside over such committees; certify all commission official documents and minutes; and act in the absence of the secretary.
 - (2) The vice chairperson shall act in the absence of the chairperson, and if both the chairperson and secretary is absent, serve as the secretary.
 - (3) The secretary shall cause a record of meeting attendance and minutes; provide notification of meetings to commission members, file official records and reports

of the commission with the city secretary; and provide notification and publications of commission meetings as prescribed by law.

(f) *Meetings*. The commission's regular meetings shall occur the first Monday of each month. The chairperson may call special meetings as may be required to comply with statutory plat approval timelines or address other emergency matters.

Section 2-43 Zoning Board of Adjustment.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment is established and governed by City Code Chapter 118, Article IV.

Section 2-44 Historic Preservation Board of Directors.

The Historic Preservation Board of Directors is established and governed by City Code Chapter 22, Article X, Division 2.

Section 2-45 Airport Zoning Board.

The Airport Zoning Board is established and governed by City Code Chapter 18, Article I.

Section 2-46 Economic Development Corporation Board of Directors.

The Economic Development Corporation Board of Directors Board is established and governed by June 11, 2008 Articles of Incorporation and the Burnet Economic Development Corporation Bylaws.

Section 2-47 Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board is established and governed by City Code Chapter 74, Article II.

Section 2-48 Board of Ethics.

The Board of Ethics is established and governed by City Code Chapter 2, Article VII.

Note to publisher: Existing Chapter 2 Articles III through X are to be recodified follows: Article III – Officers is recodified as Article IV; Article IV – Records Management is recodified as Article V; Article V – Claims Against the City is recodified as Article VI; Article VI – Investment Policy is recodified as Article VII; Article VII – Code of Ethics is recodified as Article VIII; Article VIII – Annual Reports . . .is recodified as Article IX; Article IX – Capital Improvement Plan is recodified as Article X; and Article X – Lost Personal Property is recodified as Article XI.

Background:

As council is aware the subdivision of land into buildable commercial and residential lots in many cases involves the dedication of street, water, sewer and electric infrastructure for public maintenance and use. To assure the infrastructure to be dedicated is designed correctly council adopted the city's construction manual. To assure the infrastructure is constructed in accordance to the approved designed, the public works department, in coordination with the city engineer, make periodic onsite inspections of the work site.

Information:

This ordinance would allow the city to recoup some of the costs associated with the aforementioned onsite inspections. The proposed fee would be 3.0% of the estimated construction cost for the roads, water, sewer and drainage facilities, according to calculations by the project engineer and verified by the city engineer.

The chart below was prepared by our city engineer and compares development fees charged by Austin, Buda, Georgetown, Hutto, Kyle, Leander, Marble Falls, Round Rock, and San Marcus. Burnet is the only city in the list not charging an infrastructure inspection fee and the average fee charged is 3%.

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-23

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET TEXAS AMENDING CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 98 (ENTITLED "SUBDIVISIONS") BY ADDING A CONSTRUCTION PLAN INSPECTION FEE TO SECTION 98-23; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; PROVIDING CUMULATIVE, REPEALER AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Chapter 212, City Code Chapter 98 (entitled "Subdivisions") was adopted to regulate the subdivision of land within the city's corporate and extraterritorial jurisdiction to protect the health, safety and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, in Section 98-23 thereof city council has adopted procedures for the submission of construction plans for infrastructure supporting a subdivision; and

WHEREAS, city council has determined that it is of great importance to the proper installation of the infrastructure shown on the construction plans for there to be city inspections of such installation;

WHEREAS, it is necessary to impose a fee to adequately cover the costs of such inspections; and

WHEREAS, city council has conducted a public hearing allowing members of the public to provide testimony and comments on the proposed code amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS, THAT:

Section one. Findings. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Ordinance for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the Council.

Section two. Amendment. The Code of Ordinances, Chapter 98 (entitled "Subdivision") Section 98-23 (entitled "construction plans") is hereby amended by adding the language that is underlined (underlined) to subsection 9-23(d)(4) as follows:

(d) *Procedure.* After all necessary approvals of the preliminary plat have been granted, construction plans, together with a completed application form, administrative fees, and any other federal, state or local permits required prior to construction (L.C.R.A. NPS permit, SWPPP, etc.) shall be submitted to the city engineer for approval subject to the following:

- (1) Construction plans may be submitted for review and approval simultaneously with a final plat, provided however that the final plat shall not be approved until the construction plans have been approved. If the construction plans and the final plat are to be reviewed simultaneously, a complete application for construction plans and a complete application for final plat must be submitted to the city simultaneously.
- (2) City staff shall review all construction plan submittals for administrative completeness at the time of application. If in the judgment of the city, the construction plan submittal substantially fails to meet the minimal informational requirements as outlined above, it will not be accepted for review and the construction plan shall be deemed rejected. The developer shall have up to 60 days from the date the construction plan is deemed denied to remedy all deficiencies or the construction plan shall be rejected for filing and new filing fees will be required for subsequent submittals.
- (3) The city engineer shall review the construction plans to insure compliance with this chapter, and other applicable city ordinances, codes, standards and specifications, and good engineering practices.
- (4) Upon approval of the construction plans, the applicant shall pay an inspection fee in the amount of 3.0% of the estimated construction cost for the roads, water, sewer and drainage facilities, according to calculations by a Registered Professional Engineer. These calculations must be approved by the City Engineer.

Section three. Penalty. A violation of this ordinance is unlawful and subject to City Code of Ordinances Sec. 1-6 (entitled "general penalty").

Section four. Cumulative. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all provisions of all ordinances and codes, or parts thereof, except where the provisions of this Ordinance are in direct conflict with the provisions of such Ordinances, in which event the more restrictive provision shall apply.

Section five. **Repealer**. All ordinances and codes, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.

Section six. Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

Section seven. TOMA Compliance. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, as required by Texas Government Code Chapter 551.

Section eight. Publication. The publishers of the City Code are authorized to amend said Code to reflect the changes adopted herein and to correct typographical errors and to format and number paragraphs to conform to the existing Code.

Section nine. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective upon the date of final adoption hereof and publication as required by law.

Background: Stormwater drainage form Peppermill Subdivision is designed to

convey over Applewood and Spicewood streets within the Woodlands subdivision. The current design of the road is not adequate to convey the quantity of water discharged from the

subdivisions.

Information: The city engineer is currently working with the developer's engineer

to come up with a redesign for Spicewood and Applewood to increase their carrying capacity, which will likely include new stand-up curbs and repaving the roads. The city previous discussed the need to repave the roads once Peppermill is completed, however the new design will increase the cost due to new curbs and additional

base material.

Fiscal Impact: This total project cost cannot be determined until after the

engineering is completed. The current budget was limited due to COVID concerns at the time of adopting the budget and will have to be increased to cover reconstruction of the streets. I have requested the street department to prepare a cost estimate to present to council

at the time of the meeting.
