WHEREAS, the City of Burnet, Texas (the "City") is authorized to annex territory in accordance with Texas Local Government Code, Section 43.021 and the City's homerule charter; and

WHEREAS, the territory to be annexed consists of that 1.874 acre portion of John W. Hoover Parkway located west of the City of Austin Railroad right-of-way and extending in a westerly direction to the existing City of Burnet corporate boundaries ("Annexation Area") and is adjacent to the City of Burnet corporate boundaries and within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City, under the terms of Chapter 43 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Burnet, Texas (the "City Council") has found it necessary and in the public interest to expand the city limits to include the Annexation Area as more particularly described on Exhibit "A" and by metes and bounds on Exhibit "B"; and

WHEREAS, the Annexation Area is exempt from the City's municipal annexation plan pursuant to Texas Local Government Code 43.052 (h) (1); and

WHEREAS, the City has prepared a Service Plan for the Annexation Area attached hereto as Exhibit "C"; and

WHEREAS, written notice of the City Council's intent to annex the Annexation Area was mailed in accordance to Texas Local Government Code 43.062; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held public hearings in accordance with Texas Local Government Code, Section 43.063 on January 23, 2018 and February 13, 2018; and

WHEREAS, the City Council conducted two public readings of this ordinance in accordance with Texas Local Government Code on February 13, 2018 and February 27, 2018.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>: Findings. The foregoing recitals are hereby found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted by the City Council and made part hereof for all purposes as findings of fact.

SECTION 2: **Annexation.** The tract of land and territory more particularly described on Exhibit "A" and by metes and bounds on Exhibit "B," copies of which are attached hereto and incorporated for all purposes herein, is hereby annexed to the City of Burnet, Burnet County, Texas. The boundary limits of the City of Burnet, Texas, are hereby extended to include the above described territory within the Municipal Limits of the City of Burnet, Texas, and persons residing within the same shall be inhabitants thereof shall hereafter be entitled to all rights and privileges of other citizens of the City of Burnet, Texas, and shall be bound by the acts, ordinances, resolutions and regulations of the City of Burnet.

SECTION 3: Service Plan. The Service Plan provided for in Exhibit "C", a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated for all purposes herein, is hereby adopted.

SECTION 4: **Filing.** The City Secretary is hereby directed to file with the County Clerk of Burnet County, Texas, a certified copy of this Ordinance.

<u>SECTION 5</u>: Severability. If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or other provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this ordinance, for it is the definite intent of this Council that every section, paragraph, subdivision, clause phrase, word, or provision hereof shall be given full force and effect for its purpose.

SECTION 6: **Effective Date.** This ordinance becomes effective upon its approval by City Council at second and final reading.



Upon annexation of the area identified above and as identified on Exhibit "A", the City of Burnet will provide City services utilizing methods by which it extends services to any other equivalent area of the City.

SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF ANNEXATION:

1. POLICE PROTECTION:

The City of Burnet, Texas and its Police Department will provide police protection to the newly annexed area at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area. The Police Department will have the responsibility to respond to all dispatched calls for service or assistance within the newly annexed area based on the availability of resources at the time the request for services is received.

2. FIRE PROTECTION AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES:

The City of Burnet, Texas will provide fire protection to the newly annexed area at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City, with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area.

The City of Burnet, Texas will provide Emergency Medical Services to the newly annexed area at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City, with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area. The Fire Department will have the responsibility to respond to all dispatched calls for service or assistance within the newly annexed area based on the availability of resources at the time the request for services is received.

3. MAINTENANCE OF WATER AND WASTEWATER FACILITIES:

All water and wastewater facilities owned or maintained by the City of Burnet at

the time of the proposed annexation shall continue to be maintained by the City of Burnet. All water and wastewater facilities which may be acquired subsequent to the annexation of the proposed area shall be maintained by the City of Burnet to the extent of its ownership. The now existing water and wastewater mains at existing locations shall be available for the point of use extension based upon the City of Burnet's standard extension policy now existing or as may be amended. On-site sewerage systems may be maintained in accordance with the City's Code of Ordinances.

4. SOLID WASTE COLLECTION:

Solid waste collection will be provided to citizens in the newly annexed area at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City, with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area. The City will allow continued services with an existing solid waste management provider to all annexed areas.

5. MAINTENANCE OF ROADS AND STREETS:

Any and all public roads, streets, alleyways shall be maintained to the same degree and extent that other public roads, streets, and alleyways are maintained in areas of the City with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area.

6. MAINTENANCE OF PARKS, PLAYGROUNDS AND SWIMMING POOLS:

The City of Burnet, Texas is not aware of the existence of any publicly owned parks, playgrounds or swimming pools now located in the proposed area of annexation. In the event any such parks, playgrounds, or swimming pools do exist and are public facilities, the City will maintain such areas and facilities to the extent and degree and to the same or similar level of service now being provided to other such areas and facilities within the corporate limits of the City with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area.

7. <u>MAINTENANCE OF ANY PUBLICLY OWNED FACILITY, BUILDING OR MUNICIPAL SERVICE:</u>

The City of Burnet, Texas is not aware of the existence of any publicly owned facility, building, or other municipal service now located in the proposed area of annexation. In the event any publicly owned facility, building, or other municipal service does exist and are public facilities, the City will maintain such areas and facilities to the extent and degree and to the same or similar level of service now being provided to other such areas and facilities within the corporate limits of the City with like topography, land use and populations density as those found within the newly annexed area.

8. OTHER SERVICES:

The City of Burnet, Texas, finds and determines that such services as planning, code enforcement, animal control, library, parks and recreation, court and general administration will be made available after the effective date of annexation at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City with similar topography, land use and density as those found within the newly annexed area.

CONSTRUCTION OF ANY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TO BE COMPLETED WITHIN 2-1/2 YEARS

1. POLICE AND FIRE PROTECTION AND SOLID WASTE COLLECTION:

The City of Burnet, Texas, finds and determines it is not necessary to acquire or construct any capital improvements within 2-1/2 years of the effective date of the annexation of the particular annexed area for the purpose of providing police protection, fire protection, emergency medical services or solid waste collection. The City finds and determines that it has at the present time adequate facilities and other resources to provide the same type, kind and level of service and protection which is presently being administered to other areas already incorporated in the City of Burnet, Texas with like topography, land use and population density as those found within the newly annexed area.

2. WATER AND WASTEWATER FACILITIES:

For the next 2-1/2 years, the City of Burnet, Texas finds and determines that there is sufficient capacity for water and wastewater to provide services to the annexed area pursuant to the City of Burnet's extension policies.

3. ROADS AND STREETS:

The City of Burnet, Texas, finds and determines it is not necessary to acquire or construct any capital improvements within 2-1/2 years of the effective date of the annexation of the particular annexed area.

4. MAINTENANCE OF PARKS, PLAYGROUNDS AND SWIMMING POOLS AND ANY PUBLICLY OWNED FACILITY, BUILDING OR SERVICE:

The City of Burnet, Texas, finds and determines it is not necessary to acquire or construct any capital improvements within 2-1/2 years of the effective date of the annexation of the particular annexed area for the purpose of parks, maintenance, playgrounds, swimming pools and other publicly owned facility, building or service.

5. SPECIFIC FINDINGS

The City of Burnet, Texas, finds and determines the Service Plan will not provide any fewer services and will not provide a lower level of service in the area being considered for annexation that were in existence in the proposed area at the time immediately preceding the annexation process. Given the proposed annexation area's topography, land utilization and population density, the service levels to be provided in the newly annexed area will be equivalent to those provided to other areas of the City with similar characteristics.

6. TERMS

This Service Plan shall be valid for a term of ten (10) years. Renewal of the Service Plan is at the discretion of the City of Burnet, Texas.

7. <u>LEVEL OF SERVICE</u>

Nothing in this plan shall require the City to provide a uniform level of full municipal services to each area of the City, including the annexed area, if different characteristics of topography, land use, and population density are considered a sufficient basis for providing different levels of service.

8. AMENDMENTS

The Service Plan shall not be amended unless public hearings are held in accordance with Chapter 43 of the Texas Local Government Code.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-06

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 94 – STREETS, SIDEWALKS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES BY ESTABLISHING A NEW ARTICLE III. – "WIRELESS NETWORK PROVIDERS" FOR THE PURPOSE OF REGULATION THE USE, OCCUPANCY AND MAINTENANCE OF CITY RIGHTS-OF-WAY BY WIRELESS NETWORK PROVIDERS; DESCRIBING THE PURPOSE; PROVIDING DEFINITIONS; CREATING AND REQUIRING COMPLIANCE WITH THE CITY DESIGN MANUAL AND APPLICABLE CODES FOR THE INSTALLATION OF NETWORK NODES AND NODE SUPPORT POLES PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 284 OF THE TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE; PROVIDING PROCEDURES AND TIME PERIODS FOR ACCEPTING AND PROCESSING PERMIT APPLICATIONS; PROVIDING APPLICATION AND ANNUAL PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY RENTAL FEES; RESTRICTING PLACEMENT OF NETWORK NODES AND NODE SUPPORT POLES IN MUNICIPAL PARKS; RESIDENTIAL AREAS, AND HISTORIC DISTRICTS; PROVIDING INDEMNITY FOR THE CITY; PROVIDING A REPEALER CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the City of Burnet (City) recognizes that the State of Texas has delegated to the City the fiduciary duty, as a trustee, to manage the public right-of-way for the health, safety, and welfare of the public to Texas municipalities; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 284 of the Texas Local Government Code (the Code) allows certain wireless network providers to install in the City's public rights-of-way their wireless facilities, described and defined in Section 284.002 of the Code as "Micro Network Nodes," "Network Nodes," "Node Support Poles," and Transport Facilities;: and

WHEREAS, as expressly allowed by Section 284.108 of the Code and pursuant to its police power authority reserved in Sec. 284.301 of the Code, the City has enacted a Design Manual for the Installation of Network Nodes, Node Support Poles and Transport Facilities (the Design Manual) in order to meet its fiduciary duty to the citizens of the City, and to give assistance and guidance to wireless telecommunications network providers to assist such companies in the timely, efficient, safe and aesthetically pleasing installation of technologically competitive equipment; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to regulate the installation of Network Nodes, Network Support Poles and Transport Facilities pursuant to Chapter 284 of the Code in a way that is fair, reasonable and nondiscriminatory.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS, THAT:

<u>Section 1. Findings.</u> The foregoing recitals are hereby found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted by the City Council and made a part hereof for all purposes as findings of fact.

<u>Section 2. Chapter 94, Article III – Wireless Network Providers Established.</u> A new Chapter 94, Article III – Wireless Network Providers is hereby established as follows:

Sec. 94-40 – 94-50 Reserved

Sec. 94-51. Purpose

The purpose of this article is to:

- (a) Assist the City in the competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory management of the physical use, occupancy and maintenance of its public rights-of-way by wireless network providers:
- (b) Secure fair and reasonable compensation for the physical use and occupancy of the public rights-of-way by wireless network providers in a nondiscriminatory and competitively neutral manner; and
- (c) Assist the City in protecting the public health, safety, and welfare.

Sec. 94-52. Governing Law

This chapter shall be construed in accordance with Chapter 284 of the Texas Local Government Code (the Code) to the extent not in conflict with the Constitution and laws of the United States or the State of Texas.

Sec. 94-53. Definitions

For the purpose of this article, the definitions found in the City *Design Manual for the Installation of Network Nodes, Node Support Poles, and Transport Facilities* (the Design Manual) are hereby incorporated into this article and shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning. The following definitions as found in the Design Manual are specifically applicable to this article.

Applicable Codes means

- (a) the building, fire, electrical, plumbing, or mechanical codes promulgated by a recognized national code organization and adopted by the City; and
- (b) local amendments to those codes to the extent not inconsistent with Chapter 284.

City means the City of Burnet, Texas.

City Council means the municipal governing body of the City of Burnet, Texas.

City Manager means the Manager or his/her designee for the City of Burnet, Texas.

Chapter 284 means Texas Local Government Code, Chapter 284.

Code means the Texas Local Government Code.

Collocate and collocation mean the installation, mounting, maintenance, modification, operation, or replacement of Network Nodes in a public right-of-way on or adjacent to a pole.

Decorative pole means a streetlight pole specially designed and placed for aesthetic purposes and on which no appurtenances or attachments, other than specially designed informational or directional signage or temporary holiday or special event attachments, have been placed or are permitted to be placed according to nondiscriminatory City codes and ordinances.

Easement means and shall include any public easement or other compatible use created by dedication, or by other means, to the City for public utility purposes or any other purpose whatsoever. "Easement" shall include a private easement used for the provision of utilities.

Federal Communications Commission or FCC means the Federal Administrative Agency, or lawful successor, authorized to oversee cable television and other multi-channel regulation on a national level.

Highway right-of-way means right-of-way adjacent to a state or federal highway.

Historic district means an area that is zoned or otherwise designated as a historic district under municipal, state, or federal law.

Law means common law or a federal, state, or local law, statute, code, rule, regulation, order, or ordinance.

Local means within the geographical boundaries of the City.

Location means the City-approved and lawfully permitted location of the Network Node.

Mayor means the mayor of the City of Burnet, Texas, or designee.

Micro network node means a Network Node that is not larger in dimension than 24-inches in length, 15-inches in width, and 12-inches in height, and that has an exterior antenna, if any, not longer than 11-inches.

Municipal park means an area that is zoned or otherwise designated by the City as a public park for the purpose or recreational activity.

Network node means equipment at a fixed location that enables wireless communications between user equipment and a communications network. The term:

- (a) includes:
 - (1) equipment associated with wireless communications;
 - (2) a radio transceiver, an antenna, a batter-only backup power supply, and comparable equipment, regardless of technological configuration; and
 - (3) coaxial or fiber-optic cable that is immediately adjacent to and directly associated with a particular collocation; and
- (b) does not include:
 - (1) an electric generator;
 - (2) a pole; or
 - (3) a macro tower

Network provider means:

- (a) a wireless service provider; or
- (b) a person that does not provide wireless services and that is not an electric utility but builds or installs on behalf of a wireless service provider:
 - (1) Network Nodes; or
 - (2) Node Support Poles or any other structure that supports or is capable of supporting a network node; or
 - (3) Transport Facilities

Node support pole means a pole installed by a network provider for the primary purpose of supporting a Network Node.

Permit means a written authorization for the use of the public right-of-way or collocation on a service pole required from the City before a network provider may perform an action or initiate, continue, or complete a project over which the municipality has police power authority.

Pole means a service pole, City-owned utility pole, node support pole, or utility pole.

Private easement means an easement or other real property right that is only for the benefit of the grantor and grantee and their successors and assigns.

Provider has the same meaning as "Network Provider."

Public right-of-way means the area on, below, or above a public roadway, highway, street, public sidewalk, alley, waterway, or utility easement in which the City has an interest. The term does not include:

- (a) A private easement; or
- (b) The airwaves above a public right-of-way with regard to wireless telecommunications.

Service pole means a pole, other than a City-owned utility pole, owned or operated by the City and located in a public right-of-way, including:

- (a) A pole that supports traffic control functions;
- (b) A structure for signage;
- (c) A pole that supports lighting, other than a decorative pole; and
- (d) A pole or similar structure owned or operated by a municipality and supporting only network nodes.

Street means only the paved portion of the right-of-way used for vehicular travel, being the area between the inside of the curb to the inside of the opposite curb, or the area between the two parallel edges of the paved roadway for vehicular travel where there is no curb. A "Street" is generally part of, but smaller in width than the width of the entire right-of-way, while a right-of-way may include sidewalks and utility easements. A "Street" does not include the curb or the sidewalk, if either are present at the time of a permit application or if added later.

Traffic Signal means any device, whether manually, electrically, or mechanically operated by which traffic is alternately directed to stop and to proceed.

Transport facility means each transmission path physically within a public right-of-way, extending with a physical line form a Network Node directly to the network, for the purpose of providing backhaul for network nodes.

User means a person or organization which conducts a business over facilities occupying the whole or part of a public street or right-of-way, depending on the context.

Utility pole means a pole that provides:

- (a) electric distribution with a voltage rating of not more than 34.5 kilovolts; or
- (b) services of a telecommunications provider, as defined by Chapter 284, Section 51.002, Utilities Code.

Wireless service means any service, using licensed or unlicensed wireless spectrum, including the use of Wi-Fi, whether at a fixed location or mobile, provided to the public using a Network Node.

Wireless service provider means a person that provides wireless service to the public.

Wireless facilities mean "Micro Network Nodes," "Network Nodes," "Node Support Poles," and "Transport Facilities" as defined in Texas Local Government Code, Chapter 284.

Sec. 94-54. Use and occupancy of Public Rights-of-Way

Pursuant to this chapter and subject to the Design Manual and the Code, a wireless network provider that the nonexclusive right to use and occupy the public rights-of-way in the City for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating its facilities used in the provision of Wireless Facilities.

The terms of this chapter shall apply to all wireless network providers; facilities used, in whole or part, in the provision of wireless services throughout the City, including any annexed areas upon the effective date of annexation or the date the City provides the company written notice, whichever date occurs later.

Sec. 94-55. Compliance with Design Manual and Applicable Codes

All wireless network providers shall comply with the terms of this right-of-way management ordinance, City applicable codes, and the terms and conditions of the City's Design Manual a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated for all purposes herein.

Sec. 94-56. General construction and maintenance requirements

A network provider shall construct and maintain Network Nodes, Network Support Poles and Transport Facilities described in the Code in a manner that does not:

- (a) Obstruct, impede, or hinder the usual travel or public safety on a public right-of-way;
- (b) Obstruct the legal use of a public right-of-way by other utility providers;
- (c) Violate nondiscriminatory applicable codes;

- (d) Violate or conflict with the City's publicly disclosed public right-of-way design specifications; or
- (e) Violate the federal Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA).

Sec. 94-57. Permit applications

- (a) Except as otherwise provided in Chapter 284 of the Code, a network provider shall obtain a permit or permits from the City to install a Network Node, Node Support Pole, or Transport Facility in a City public right-of-way.
- (b) As required by Chapter 284 of the Code, the City shall not require a network provider to perform services for the City for which the permit is sought.
- (c) A network provider that wants to install or collocate multiple Network Nodes inside the municipal limits of the City is entitled to file a consolidated permit application with the City for not more than thirty (30) Network Nodes and upon payment of the applicable fee(s), receive a permit or permits for the installation of collection of those Network Nodes.
- (d) The network provider shall provide the following information in its permit applications:
 - (1) Applicable construction and engineering drawings and information to confirm that the applicant will comply with the City's Design Manual and applicable codes;
 - (2) Any additional information reasonably related to the network provider's use of the public rights-of-way to ensure compliance with the Design Manual and this chapter;
 - (3) A certificate that the Network Node(s) complies with the applicable regulations of the Federal Communications Commission; and certification that the proposed Network Node(s) will be placed into active commercial service by or for the network provider not later than the 60th day after the date of construction and final testing or each Network Node is completed.
 - (4) A certificate of insurance that provides that the Network Provider and its contractor has at least \$1,000,000.00 (one-million dollars) in general liability coverage.
- (e) **Exception:** As provided in Section 284. 157 of the Code, a Network Provider is not required to apply, obtain a permit, or pay a rate to the City for:
 - (1) Routine maintenance that does not require excavation or closing of sidewalks, recreational trails, or vehicular lanes in a public right-of-way;
 - (2) Replacing or upgrading a Network Node or Network Pole with a node or pole that is substantially similar in size or smaller and that does not require excavation or closing of sidewalks, recreational trails, or vehicular lanes in a public right-of-way;
 - (3) The installation, placement, maintenance, operation or replacement of Micro Network Nodes that are strung on cables between existing poles or Node Support Poles in compliance with the National Electrical Safety Code; or
 - (4) Notwithstanding Subdivision (e) above, the network provider or its contractors shall notify the City at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance of work described in this Subdivision (e).

Sec. 94-58. Installation in Historic Districts

A Network Provider must obtain advance written consent from the City Council before collocating new Network Nodes or installing new Node Support Poles in an area of the City that has been zoned or otherwise designated as a Historic District. The network provider shall be required to comply with the General Aesthetic Requirements described in the City's Design Manual. The City has the authority to designate new Historic Districts at a future date.

Sec. 94-59. Installation in Municipal Parks and residential areas.

A network provider may not install a new Node Support Pole in a public right-of-way without the City Council's discretionary, nondiscriminatory and written consent if the public right-of-way:

- (1) Is in a municipal park; or
- (2) Is adjacent to a street or thoroughfare that is:
 - (A) Not more than fifty (50) feet wide: and
 - (B) Adjacent to single-family residential lots or other multifamily residences or undeveloped land that is designated for residential use by zoning or deed restrictions.
- (3) In addition to the above, a Network Provider installing a Network Node, Node Support Pole, or Transport Facilities in a public Right-of-Way shall comply with private deed restrictions and other private restrictions in the area that apply to those facilities.
- (4) The Network Provider shall be further required to comply with guidelines set out in the City's Design Manual

Sec. 94.60. Municipal review process by the City.

- (a) **Determination of Application Completeness:** The City shall determine whether the permit application is complete and notify the applicant of that determination:
 - (1) For Network Nodes and Node Support Poles: No later than thirty (30) days after the date the City receives the permit application.
 - (2) For a Transport Facility: No later than ten (10) days after the date the City receives the permit application.
- (b) **Approval or denial of application:** The City shall approve or deny a completed application after the date it is submitted to the City:
 - (1) For Network Nodes: No later than sixty (60) days after the date the City receives the complete application.
 - (2) For Network Support Poles: No later than one-hundred-fifty (150) days after the date the City receives the complete application.
 - (3) For Transport Facilities: No later than twenty-one (21) days after the City receives the complete application.

- (c) Basis for denial of application: If an application is denied by the City, the City shall document the basis for the denial, including the specific applicable City code provisions or other City rules, regulations, or other law on which the denial is based. The documentation for the denial must be sent by electronic mail to the applicant on or before the date that the City denies the application.
- (d) **Resubmission of denied application:** The applicant may cure the deficiencies identified in the denied application.
 - (1) The applicant has thirty (30) days from the date the City denies the completed application to cure the deficiencies identified in the denial documentation without paying an additional application fee, other than any fee for actual costs incurred by the City.
 - (2) The City shall approve or deny the revised completed application after a denial not later than the ninetieth (90th) day aft the City receives the revised completed application. The City's review shall be limited to the deficiencies cited in the denial documentation.
- (e) **Nondiscriminatory review:** Each completed application shall be processed by the City on a nondiscriminatory basis.

Sec. 94-61. Time of Installation.

A Network Provider shall begin installation for which a permit is granted not later than six months after final approval of the application and shall diligently pursue installation to completion. The City Manager may in his/her sole discretion grant reasonable extensions of time as requested by the network provider.

Sec. 94-62. Applicable fees and rental rates to the city.

- (a) As compensation for the Network Provider's use and occupancy of the City public rights-of-way, the Network Provider shall pay application fees and annual public right-of-way rental rates as set forth herein, which shall not be in lieu of any lawful tax, license, charge, right-of-way permit, use, construction, street cut or inspection fee; or other right-of-way relate charge or fee, whether charged to the Network Provider or its contractor(s) within the City, except the usual general ad valorem taxes, special assessments and sales tax levied in accordance with state law and equally applicable to all general businesses in the City.
- (b) Schedule of Fees relating to this article shall be as follows:

Network Nodes	
Application fee 1 to 5 nodes	\$ 500.00
Fee for each additional node up to a maximum of 30	\$ 250.00

Annual Public Right-of-Way fee	\$1,000.00
Collocation fee (per pole) for Network Nodes on City Service Poles	\$ 12.00
Transport Facilities	
Application Fee 1 to 5 nodes	\$ 500.00
Fee for each additional node up to a maximum of 30	\$ 250.00
Transport Rental Facility rental fee per device, per month, not to exceed the aggregate "per node " fee	\$ 28.00

(c) Public Right-of-Way adjustment: As provided in Sec. 284.054 of the Code, the City may adjust the amount of the annual public right-of-way rate not more than annually by an amount equal to one-half the annual change, if any, in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for all Urban Consumers for Texas. The City shall provide written notice to each network provider of the new rate; and the rate shall apply to the first payment due to the City on or after the sixtieth (60th) day following the written notice.

(d) Micro Network Nodes:

- (1) No application fee is required for a Micro Network Node if the installation is attached on lines between poles or node support poles.
- (e) Collocation of network Nodes on Services Poles:
 - (1) Subject to the City's Pole Service Agreement, there shall be a fee assessed per year per pole for collocation of Network Nodes on City service poles.
- (f) City-owned municipal utility poles
 - (1) A Network Provider shall pay an annual pole attachment rate for the collocation of a Network Node supported by or installed on a City-owned utility pole based on the pole attachment rate consistent with Section 54.024 of the Texas Utilities Code, applied on a per-foot basis.
- (g) The City shall not seek or accept in-kind services in lieu of or as additional payment or consideration from any user of the public rights-of-way for use of the public rights-ofway.

Sec. 94-63. Indemnity

As provided in Section 284.302 of the Code, a wireless Network Provider shall indemnify, defend, and hold the City harmless from and against all liability, damages, cost, and expense, including reasonable attorney's fees, arising from injury to person or property proximately caused by the negligent act or omission of the Network Provider. The City shall promptly notify the Network Provider of any claims, demands, or actions (claims) covered by this indemnity after which the Network Provider shall defend the claims. The Network Provider shall have the right to defend and compromise the claims. The City shall cooperate in the defense of the claims. The foregoing indemnity obligations shall not apply to claims arising solely from the negligence of the City; however, they shall apply in the case of all claims which arise from the joint negligence of the Network Provider and the City; provided that in such cases, the amount of the claims for which the City shall be entitled to indemnification shall be limited to that portion attributable to the Network Provider. Nothing in this section shall be construed as waiving any governmental immunity available to the City under state law or waiving any defenses of the parties under state law.

Sec. 94-64 Effect on other utilities and telecommunication providers.

Nothing in this Ordinance shall govern attachment of Network Notes on poles and other structures owned or operated by investor-owned electric utilities, electric cooperatives, telephone cooperatives, or telecommunication providers.

<u>Section 3. Repealer.</u> That other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in conflict.

<u>Section 4. Severability.</u> That should any provisions of this ordinance be held void or unconstitutional, it is hereby provided that all other parts of the same which are not held void or unconstitutional shall remain in full force and effect.

<u>Section 5. Effective Date.</u> That this ordinance is effective upon final passage and approval.

<u>Section 6. Open Meetings.</u> That it is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meeting Act, Chapter. 551, Loc. Gov't. Code.

Background:

Information: State law provides that a city may utilize the Construction

Manager at-Risk (CMR) method of delivery for a construction project, provided that the "City" makes a determination that such method provides the best value to the City prior to entering into such an agreement. State law also provides that the council may delegate such authority either to a committee or to the City Manager. If the Council chose to delegate their authority, it would eliminate the need for the City Council to take formal action prior to every bid process.

Fiscal Impact: None at this time.

Recommendation: Staff recommends approval of Resolution R2018-03 as

presented.

RESOLUTION NO. R2018-03

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET DELEGATING AUTHORITY TO THE CITY MANAGER TO DETERMINE WHETHER ALTERNATE PROJECT DELIVERY METHODS USED TO CONSTRUCT VARIOUS PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS PROVIDES THE BEST VALUE FOR THE CITY, IN ACCORDANCE WITH TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE CHAPTER 2269

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code (LGC) § 252.021 provides that, unless otherwise excepted, before a city may enter into a contract that requires an expenditure of more than \$50,000, the city must: (1) comply with the procedures prescribed in LGC, Chapter 252 for competitive sealed bidding or competitive sealed proposals; (2) use the reverse auction procedure provided in Texas Government Code § 2155.062(d); or (3) comply with a method described in Texas Government Code, Chapter 2269; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code, Chapter 2269 provides several alternate project delivery methods for the construction of public works, including the construction manager-agent method, the construction manager-at-risk method, the design-build method and the job order contracts method, that in certain circumstances and projects may provide a better value to the City when compared to the standard competitive bidding or competitive proposal methods; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code § 2269.001 et seq. is applicable to public works contracts, which are defined as the constructing, altering, or repairing a public building or carrying out or completing any public work; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code § 2269.056 provides that before a city may use a construction contract method provided by Chapter 2269, other than competitive bidding, the city must determine which method provides the best value for the governmental entity; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code § 2269.053 authorizes the City to delegate its authority to make best value determinations to a designated representative, committee, or other person, provided that notice of such delegation, the limits of such delegation and the name or title of each person so designated are established by the City; and

WHEREAS, in certain circumstances depending on the type of a given public works project, alternate delivery methods provide a better product ensuring the effective, efficient and responsible use of City revenues.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS:

Section 1.

That the foregoing recitals are found to be true and are incorporated herein as findings of fact for all purposes.

Section 2.

That the City Council of the City of Burnet, Texas finds it to be in the best interest of the City to delegate its authority and that the City does hereby delegate its authority to the City Manager to determine whether an alternate project delivery method established under Texas Government Code, Chapter 2269 and/or Texas LGC, Chapter 252 provides the best value for the City for public works projects, said determination to be made in accordance with the criteria provided by these State laws.

PASSED AND ADOPTED this 27th day of February 2018 at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Burnet, Texas, which meeting was held in compliance with the Open Meetings Act, Tex. Gov't Code, §551.001, et seq. at which meeting a quorum was present and voting.

Background: The Home Rule Charter of the City of Burnet, Section

3.04. <u>Judge of Election Qualifications</u>: States that the City Council shall be the judge of the election and qualifications of its new members. The City Council shall also, at the first meeting after the filing deadline, by majority vote either approve or disapprove the Section 3.03 qualifications of each candidate. If the City Council finds that a candidate does not meet all qualifications set forth in Section 3.03,

such candidate's name shall not be placed on the ballot.

The Home Rule Charter of the City of Burnet, Section 3.03. Qualifications: States that a citizen who desires to become a candidate for an elective City office shall file with the City Secretary a signed, sworn application for the citizen's name to appear on the ballot. The application shall represent that the citizen meets each qualification for the office. The application shall be filed not less than forty-five (45) calendar days prior to the date of the election. Each candidate for an elective City office shall have the following qualifications as of the time and date the candidate files the application:

- Shall be a U.S. citizen.
- Shall be a registered voter of the City, and twentyone (21) years of age or over.
- Shall have resided for at least twelve (12) months preceding the election within the corporate limits of the City or within an area having been annexed into the City.

- Shall not be in arrears in the payment of any taxes or other liabilities due the City. "In arrears" is defined herein to mean that payment has not been received within ninety (90) days from due date.
- Shall not have been finally convicted of a felony from which the candidate has not been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disabilities.
- Shall be disqualified by reason of having been judged incompetent by a final judgment of court, or by reason of any provision of any other section of this Charter or by any provision of State law.
- Shall not be a candidate for any other office in the same election.
- Shall not be an employee of the City at the time of filing for office.

<u>Section</u> 3. <u>General Election</u>. There being no contest for the three offices of City Councilmember and the declaration in Section 2 above having been made, pursuant to the

authority of Section 2.053(b), Tex. Elec. Code, the May 5, 2018 General Election of the City is hereby cancelled.

<u>Section</u> 4. <u>Directions to City Secretary</u>. The City Secretary is hereby directed to post a copy of this resolution on the bulletin board at the city hall and, on Election Day, a copy of this resolution shall be posted on the door of the polling place. Such posting at the polling place shall be made in a manner to be readable to persons outside the polling place. The City Secretary shall further issue to each person declared elected, as named in Section 2, a certificate of election as provided in Section 2.053(c), Tex. Elec. Code.

Background: In 1990 the City Council voted to exempt freeport goods

from taxation, however they failed to follow-up with an ordinance to formally adopt the freeport exemption. Late last year the city realized the exemption had not been properly adopted, which resulted in two businesses being taxed on freeport goods that had been exempted the previous year.

Information: Recently, city staff learned of a business that is relocating

from Marble Falls to Burnet, where they currently receive the exemption (Gibraltar). The exemption is currently offered by Burnet County, both MFISD and BCISD, and the City of Marble Falls. Once the freeport exemption is adopted, it cannot be rescinded. Council directed staff to present an

ordinance for consideration at the last council meeting.

Fiscal Impact: For tax year 2017, the City received approximately \$56,500

that would be exempt in future years if the exemption is adopted. If Council chooses not to adopt the exemption, and Gibraltar proceeds with relocation to Burnet, their taxes

would increase by an estimated \$20,000.

Recommendation: Staff recommends adoption of Ordinance 2018-07 providing

an exemption on freeport goods as presented.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-07

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS, RESCINDING ANY PREVIOUS ORDINANCE, RESOLUTION, ORDER, OR DECREE THAT AUTHORIZED THE TAXATION OF FREEPORT GOODS AND GRANTING A FREEPORT TAX EXEMPTION; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Texas Tax Code § 11.251 and Texas Constitution Article VIII, Section 1-j provide for the exemption of certain tangible personal property from ad valorem taxation; and

WHEREAS, "Freeport Goods" as referred to herein shall mean that property as defined by Texas Tax Code § 11.251 and Texas Constitution Article VIII, Section 1-i; and

WHEREAS, the City of Burnet adopted Ordinance/Resolution 89-8 on December 12, 1989, to deny tax exempt status to Freeport Goods; and

WHEREAS, Texas Constitution Article VIII, Section 1-j(b) provides that (1) the City may subsequently exempt Freeport Goods from taxation by rescinding its action to tax Freeport Goods; (2) the exemption applies to each tax year that begins after the date the action is taken and applies to the tax year in which the action is taken if the governing body so provides; and (3) the City may not take action to tax such Freeport Goods after the rescission; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Burnet, Texas finds that rescinding its prior action to tax Freeport Goods is in the best interest of the City and thereby grant the exemption for Freeport Goods for companies eligible for such exemption.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURNET, TEXAS:

Section 1. <u>Findings.</u> The findings and recitations set out hereinabove are found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted by the City Council and made a part hereof for all purposes as findings of fact.

Section 2. Rescission. The City of Burnet, Texas hereby rescinds any all prior actions to tax Freeport Goods in accordance with Texas Constitution Article VIII, Section 1-j(b).

Section 3. Exemption. The City of Burnet, Texas does hereby exercise its authority under Texas Constitution Article VIII, Section 1-j(b) and exempts Freeport Goods from ad valorem taxation.

Section 4. <u>Tax-Exempt Effective Date.</u> The City of Burnet, Texas does hereby make the tax-exempt status of qualified Freeport Goods effective and applicable to the tax year in which this Ordinance is adopted and to each tax year after the date of adoption of this Ordinance.

Section 5. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances. All Ordinances or parts thereof in conflict herewith are amended to the extent of such conflict only.

Section 6. <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this ordinance or the application of any provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications hereof which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 7. Open Meetings. It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551, Local Government Code.

Section 8. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the City Council and publication as required by the Local Government Code.

Financial Report for the Period Ending January 2018

Overview

The monthly financial report is directed at providing a snapshot of revenues and expenditures as well as other important financial information through the month of January 2018. Attached to this report are financial summaries that indicate the annual budget, year-to-date budget, financial activity for the fiscal year-to-date and comparison to the prior year at the same time.

General Fund Revenues

As of January 2018, General Fund revenues total \$4,647,896 or 38.53% of the annual budget. This is a significant increase; mainly driven by property taxes received during the month of January. The majority of property tax revenue is collected during the months of December - February. Since this is a large source of income for the General Fund, the timing of collections has a significant impact on the overall revenue collections. During the budgeting process, the Central Appraisal District sends the City a certified tax roll that is used to calculate the anticipated property taxes to be levied and collected in the next budget cycle. This year, that tax roll contained a 15% increase mainly as the result of new property added and valuation changes that had occurred and that has been reflected in the budget for FY 2017-18. \$1,665,997 of property taxes have been collected which is 15.45% more than last year. While we expect this difference to level out in February, we will still see a large increase in this year compared to last year because of the changes in the tax roll itself.

Sales Tax is another large source of income for the fund. Currently, the City has received \$547,979 of Sales Tax revenue which is an increase of 6.09% over the same period last year.

EMS Billing Collections are not only a significant source of revenue, but can be very volatile and difficult to predict. Many factors can influence collections such as the number of EMS runs each month, the number of private pay patients vs the number of patients with insurance, insurance rule changes, and the type of insurance the patient may have. When these collections are below budget, it has a major effect on the overall revenue and it becomes important to offset the reduced revenue with a reduction in expenses. Collections are currently \$557,183 representing a \$16,708 or 2.91% decrease from last year at the same time.

The final major revenue source for the General Fund are the Allocation Transfers. The majority of this revenue comes from fees assessed to the Electric Fund and the Water/Wastewater Fund in the form of Return on Investment, In-Lieu of Property Tax and In-Lieu of Franchise Tax. Since these utilities are owned by the City they are not assessed taxes that would be required if they were held by private ownership. The fees are based on the revenue of the utility fund and help maintain the health of the General Fund. Other fees are assessed to funds for a proportionate amount of the Administration and Mayor and Council departments and the Shop Department. The current revenue is \$841,692 or 31.93% of the annual budget.

Expenditures

General Fund Expenditures total \$3,527,461 and are in line with budget. The major variable to the expenditures is the Transfers to Other Funds. These transfers are going to the Golf Course to cover the Administration Allocation and operating losses in the fund, and to the Capital Project Funds for Golf and General Government. Timing of the capital projects will have a significant effect on the actual year to date expenditures reported. Currently, the Golf Course is showing a profit, therefore, no transfer has been made for operating losses.

Delaware Springs Golf Course Revenues

The total revenue for the Golf Course are currently \$485,021. Since the Golf Course is showing a profit of \$22,632, there has been no transfer from the General Fund to cover operating losses. At this time last year, the General Fund had transfered \$27,462.

Two other revenue categories are showing significant increases over last year. Fees for Services are \$349,219 which is \$24,303 more than last year. Snack Bar sales are \$14,302 greater than last year. However, Sales of Merchandise is showing a decrease of \$11,058 from last year.

Expenditures

Expenditures are \$462,389 and well within the year to date budget of \$495,910 . This also represents a decrease of \$25,398 from last year at the same time.



Electric Fund Revenues

Total revenues from Electric Sales are \$2,742,227 which is an increase of \$150,114 over last year. Each dollar of Electric Sales is made up of two components. The first is the LCRA (Lower Colorado River Authority) purchase price derived by dividing the total dollar amount billed by LCRA by the kWh purchased. That rate is applied to each class of electric customers equally and can vary depending on the charges from LCRA. The second component of the amount is the Customer Distribution Charge or CDC. This charge was adopted by Council several years ago and remains consistent until the Council votes to make a change. The CDC represents the cost of providing electric service to our customers and vary by Customer Class. Customer Class is determined by the type of use and the kWh used by the individual customer.

Since a portion of the monthly electric rate is simply a pass-through to the customer based on what the City has been charged by LCRA, the Net Sales amount is a more valuable measurement than just looking at the sales dollars. Net Sales are exactly what they imply: total sales dollars less the cost of power. The result is the true amount that the City receives to cover the expenses of the Fund. Net Sales are \$1,168,842 this year.

Expenditures

Expenditures excluding Cost of Power are \$1,061,026 and well within the budget of \$1,183,036.









Sales Tax collected by the state is remitted to the City two months later. Therefore, the spike in Sales Tax Revenue shown in February reflects the tax collected in December.


Property Tax Revenue




Property Taxes are collected by the Central Appraisal District and remitted to the City. Fluctuations in monthly numbers are the result of when the taxes are paid.




Electric Sales Net Revenue



Water / Wastewater Sales Revenue




Utility revenue from month to month can be very volatile depending on weather and consumption patterns.
